

Francophone Postcolonial Literature (M.St. Special Subject)

Michaelmas Term 2018

Students will meet for 4 sessions of 1.5 hours each. There will be a reading list of 2-3 texts to read for each session, and students are advised to have made a good start on the primary reading before term begins. At the start of term, students should have chosen two areas on which they will write essays (2500-3000 words each); they will do a short presentation (10-15 minutes) on one of the remaining two areas.

Week 2. Exoticism
