Info for Delegates

Oxford is easily accessible via train and air. Direct trains come from London Paddington, London Marylebone, and Birmingham. The major London airports (Heathrow and Gatwick) are accessible by direct coach (the <u>Airline</u>). There is also a regular coach service from London, the <u>Oxford Tube</u> which runs very frequently and all night. St John's College is about a 15-minute walk from Oxford railway station or there are direct buses up to St Aldates which is a 5-minute walk from St John's. From the coach station, Gloucester Green, it is a 5-minute walk to St John's College. It is not advisable to come by car (ZEZ, bus gates and limited and expensive parking). The city runs an ebike and scooter scheme via Lime and Voi.

Other Venues

The Taylor Institution Library (where one strand of panels takes place in Room 2, as well as the exhibition, recital and drinks on Tuesday, is the rather grand building opposite St John's and attached to the Ashmolean Museum. Access is up the ramp on St Giles. You will need to wear your lanyard to be assured access.

Somerville College where the session with Ulrike Draesner and Caroline Bergvall will take place on Wednesday afternoon is on the same road (St Giles), same side as the Taylor, c. 5 minutes' walk from St John's. Ask at the Porters Lodge there for access to the Flora Anderson Hall.

St Edmund Hall where the compline takes place on Tuesday evening is a nice 15-minute walk through Oxford.

Please keep speakers to time to be fair to everyone (also in case colleagues want to move over to another session), and finish sessions promptly.

Oxford

There is a nice pub next to St John's The Lamb and Flag. Many other pubs, cafes and restaurants are 5-10 minutes' walk away. The Indoor Market between High Street and Market Street offers cafes, fresh food etc. The pedestrianised Cornmarket and The Westgate Shopping Centre (off Queen's Street) have all the main chains. There are nice walks nearby in Christ Church Meadow, the University Parks, and the Botanical Garden. And the famous Ashmolean Museum is directly opposite, attached to the Taylorian, while the Natural History Museum is also close by.
